Market minute



## **Equities**

U.S. stocks gained a third consecutive week as performance broadened out into small-cap and value stocks. The market reverted to megacap leadership through the year's first 3 weeks, as the S&P 500 gain 1.5% but just 38% of stocks were positive; however, a solid start to earnings season and strong U.S. economic date pushed two-thirds of names into positive territory last week adding another 1.06% gain. The S&P 500 fwd. P/E ratio eclipsed 20x for the first time since 2022. Stocks in Europe, Asia, and EM all rose last week but remain down YTD as U.S. leadership endures.

## **Fixed income**

Benchmark yields were broadly unchanged last week as a pre-FOMC holding pattern settled over the market. The 10-year Treasury held a relatively tight range of 4.08% to 4.19% and ended the week close to the middle. No rate change is expected at the January 31 meeting this week, but markets still have 50/50 odds of a rate cut at the March 20 meeting. The FOMC statement and Fed Chair Powell's press conference will likely provide some guidance for markets on this front. Looking further out the curve, despite several weeks of strong data, markets still expect 135 bps of rate cuts in 2024, down a little from a peak of 165 bps.

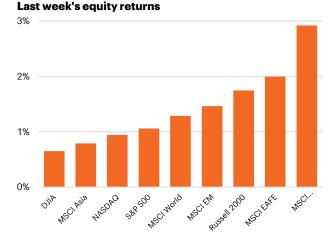
## **Commodities**

Crude prices rose into the upper-\$70s - the highest since late November - on the back of strong U.S. growth data. U.S. crude production plummeted in the most recent data due to record-cold temperatures across much of the country, causing a large drop in inventories and boosting prices. Industrial metals such as copper gained on the positive cyclical backdrop, as well, while gold slumped.

## **Economic overview**

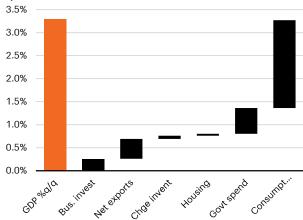
In Q4, the economy was firing on all cylinders with growth of 3.3%, holding significant positive momentum. Household consumption was once again the big engine driving above-potential growth, and in Q4 households spent cheerfully on goods and services. Business investment, a smaller sector, grew 1.9% and also saw gains in each major category. Government spending contributed 0.56% to the headline number and has been a positive contributor to growth all year. This rounds out an exceptional year – growth in 2023 ended at 3.1%, eclipsing the consensus expectation of a meager 0.5% growth at the start of the year.

LIBOR is the most widely used "benchmark" or reference rate for short-term interest rates. Treasury rates: Market yields for U.S. Treasury securities with maturities of 2, 10 and 30 years.
